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

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

39. GOVERNMENT HOUSE Home to Tasmania's Governors since 1858, this is a fine example of an early Victorian country house in neo-Gothic style and one of the largest of its type in Australia.

The Beaumaris Zoo once housed a wide variety of animals including lions, tigers, snow leopards, elephants, monkeys and, incredibly, polar bears. It is most notably remembered as the home of he last Thylacine in captivity.
